Impact on Spiritual life

From the wife of a pastor...



It is so hard to understand how depression changes everything about how a person sees the world.... My relationship with God has been deeper, more primitive, more fraught, and sometimes so painfully distant in the midst of depression. The law is misery to me when I am deeply depressed; grace absurd and life-giving.

Pastors who suffer stress and affliction, like any Christian in similar circumstances, may be tempted to look to their faith as a reason for self-esteem and assurance, rather than to the only object of faith, Christ and His pardoning Word. They conclude that failure and inability to cope are due to weak faith or the lack of faith altogether. They are viewing faith as their act rather than as their reception of God's mercy.

Reception: The Story of Merle

- Raised 5 Daughters by himself
- Ever present, ever serving, ever positive
- Cancer
- “Pastor, I don’t want to be a burden on anyone!”
- “Sometimes the greatest gift you can give is to let others serve you.”



The Confessions...

Thus the worship and divine service of the Gospel is to receive from God gifts; on the contrary, the worship of the Law is to offer and present our gifts to God ...This passage, too, brings the greatest consolation, as the chief worship of the Gospel is to wish to receive remission of sins, grace, and righteousness. Of this worship Christ says, John 6, 40: This is the will of Him that sent Me, that every one which seeth the Son, and believeth on Him, may have everlasting life. (Ap III, paragraph 189)

- Food



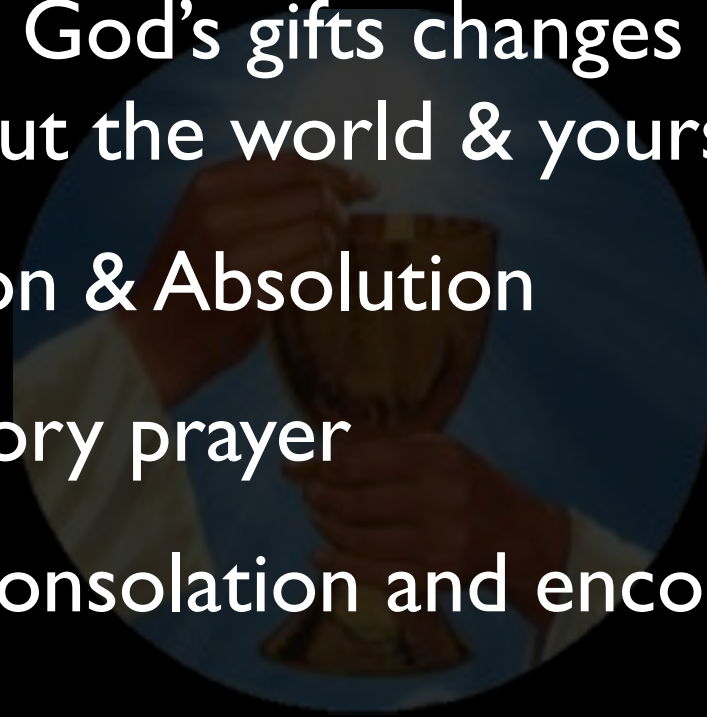
Mental

- Regular consolation and encouragement in the Word

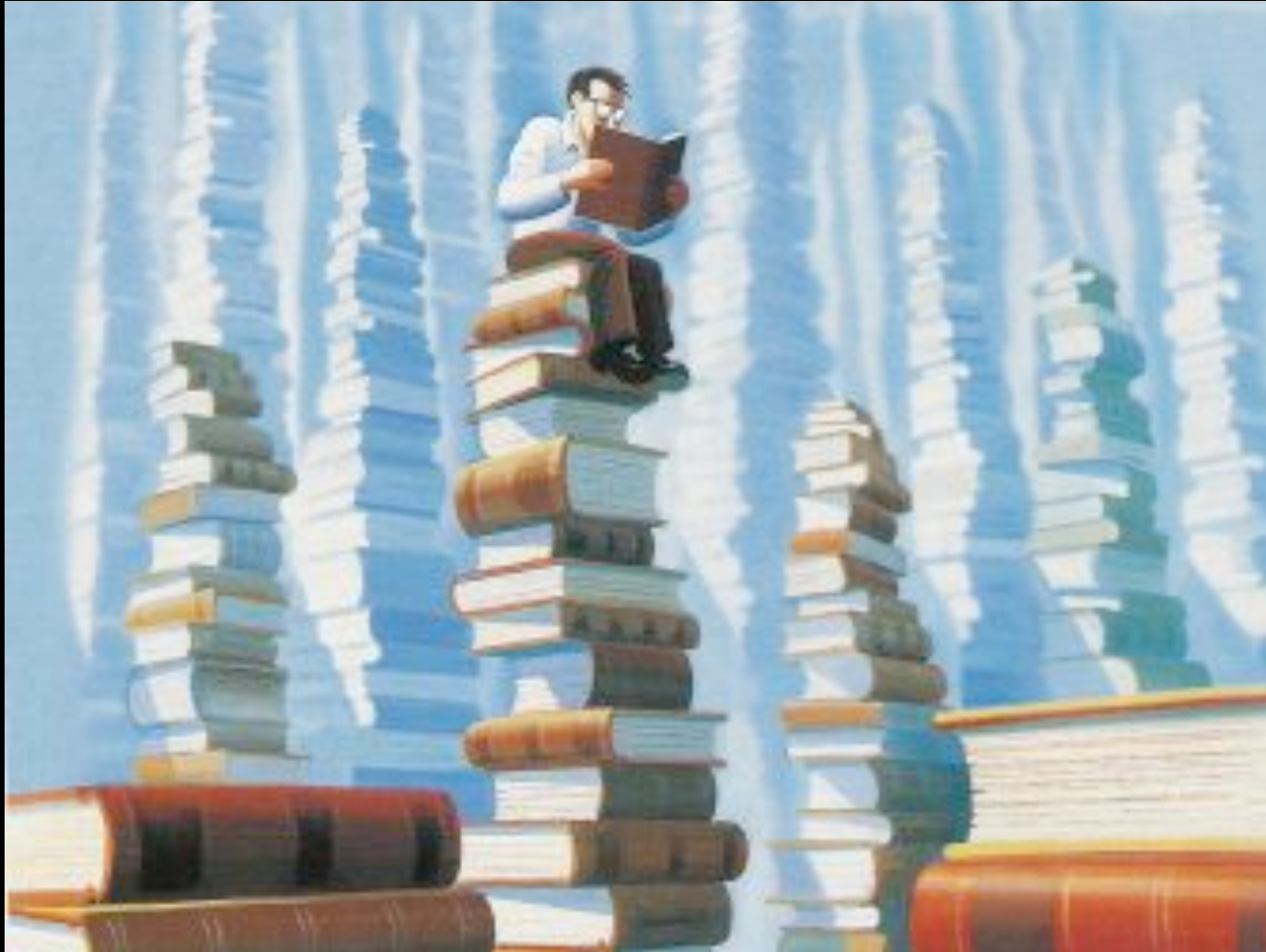


Personal

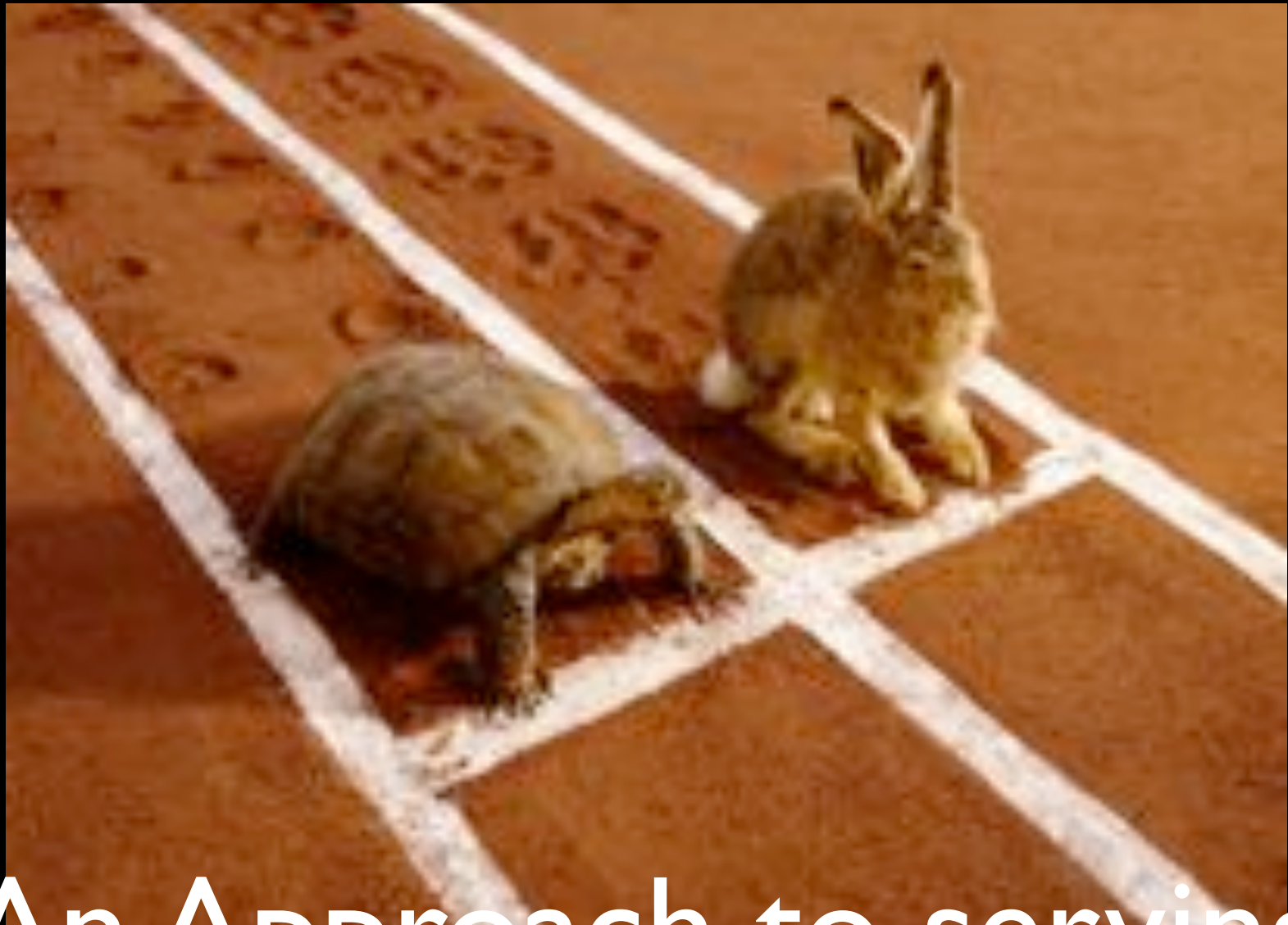
